A NOTE FROM FR. TOM

Psalm 40:2, 3, 4, 18

R: Lord, come to my aid!

I have waited, waited for the LORD, and he stooped toward me. R

The LORD heard my cry.

He drew me out of the pit of destruction, out of the mud of the swamp;
he set my feet upon a crag;
he made firm my steps. R

And he put a new song into my mouth, a hymn to our God.

Many shall look on in awe and trust in the LORD.

Though I am afflicted and poor, yet the LORD thinks of me.
You are my help and my deliverer;
O my God, hold not back! R

Psalms 40 and 41 together bring Book I of the psalms to an end on a note of lament. As is typical with the psalms of Book I, Psalm 40 finds David in distress, beset by his enemies, and seeking God's assistance. Atypical, however, is the reversed order of the psalm. Most psalms of this type start off with lament and end with praise and thanksgiving. Psalm 40 reverses this order, beginning with thanks and praise for God's deliverance, and ending with a cry for God's help in some new threat that seems to have arisen.

As the Responsorial Psalm this week, Psalm 40 responds to the First Reading from the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah, in which Jeremiah's enemies throw him to the bottom of a cistern, where he sinks into the mud. Notice how Jeremiah's rescue from death is paralleled by David's experience of rescue in the psalm: The Lord heard my cry. | He drew me out of the pit of destruction, | out of the mud of the swamp; | he set my feet upon a crag; | he made firm my steps.

Thinking of the times that God has rescued us (or Jeremiah, or David) gives us confidence to ask God for help in the situations and circumstances in which we find ourselves, those times when we are sinking into the mud. Whatever our situation, we are within God's providence: *The LORD thinks of me*, as the psalm says. This week, be confident in your prayer.

The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary | Feast Day — August 15



The Story of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity. There were few dissenting voices. What the pope solemnly declared was already a common belief in the Catholic Church.

We find homilies on the Assumption going back to the sixth century. In following centuries, the Eastern Churches held steadily to the doctrine, but some authors in the West were hesitant. However by the 13th century there was universal agreement. The feast was celebrated under various names—Commemoration, Dormition, Passing, Assumption—from at least the fifth or sixth century. Today it is celebrated as a solemnity.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's assumption into heaven. Nevertheless, Revelation 12 speaks of a woman who is caught up in the battle between good and evil. Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both Old and New Testaments, her assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory. Furthermore, in 1 Corinthians 15:20, Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. Since Mary is closely

associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to believe in Mary's share in his glorification. So close was she to Jesus on earth, she must be with him body and soul in heaven.

Reflection. In the light of the Assumption of Mary, it is easy to pray her Magnificat (Luke 1:46–55) with new meaning. In her glory she proclaims the greatness of the Lord and finds joy in God her savior. God has done marvels to her and she leads others to recognize God's holiness. She is the lowly handmaid who deeply reverenced her God and has been raised to the heights. From her position of strength she will help the lowly and the poor find justice on earth, and she will challenge the rich and powerful to distrust wealth and power as a source of happiness.

August is the Month of the Immaculate Heart of Mary

Devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary is an ancient custom, tied to a passage from the Gospel of Luke that speaks of Mary's heart, "(and a sword will pierce through your own soul also), that thoughts out of many hearts may be revealed" (Luke 2:35). By the 17th century the devotion became more widespread and at about the same time images of Mary with her Immaculate Heart rose in popularity. The image appears to be simple, but the symbolism behind it is complex. First of all Mary's heart is visible outside of her body. This points to her undying love for all people. Her love is such that she can not contain it within. Some artists choose to depict the Blessed Virgin carrying her heart in her hand or simply pointing with a finger to her heart. The gesture suggests that Mary wants to give her heart to the one who is viewing the image. Secondly, her heart is typically on fire, which emphasizes the intensity of her love for God and for humanity. Next there are white roses that encircle her heart. These symbolize her purity, brought about by her Immaculate Conception, creating within her a most pure heart. In some cases her heart is also shown with a lily coming out of the top, also symbolizing her purity. A single sword is sometimes added going through her heart, referring to the passage of Luke ("a sword shall pierce...") and brings to mind the sorrows she endured during her lifetime, especially during the crucifixion. Last of all, the heart is typically surrounded by rays of light. This brings to mind Revelation 12:1, where it describes the Blessed Virgin Mary as "a woman clothed with the sun."



Known as Bernard of Clairvaux, this French abbot and doctor of the church is considered the second founder of the Cistercians. He entered the relatively new monastery at Citeaux in 1113 with four of his own brothers and 27 friends, and later founded the monastery at Clairvaux, which gave birth to 68 other communities. Despite poor heath and his devotion to personal mortification, Bernard was an early Western European rock star. He was consulted by popes and kings, battled heresies, and supported the Second Crusade. The sick and maimed lined the roads he traveled, hoping for a miracle. Dante chose Bernard as his final guide in "Paradiso," at the end of "The Divine Comedy." He is the patron of Gibraltar.


